THE THEME OF OUR WORSHIP:

WELCOME! Thank you for joining us for worship this New Year's Eve. At St. Paul's, you will find a worship service designed to praise God and increase people's faith. While all styles of worship take some getting used to, we hope you will find that the main message – the unconditional love Jesus has for us – comes through clearly.

PARTICIPATE. Many parts of our worship service are interactive. Feel free to sing along with the hymns and songs. There are also times in the service when Pastor and congregation speak back and forth. Please join together as you feel comfortable.

PARAMENTS. In Lutheran churches you often see paraments. These are the colored cloths with symbols on them hanging from the altar and pulpit. They change with the church seasons and celebrations as a visual reminder of what we are celebrating in our worship. The color for the Christmas season is white...a symbol of purity and joy. For this reason, the paraments, religious ornaments (Chrismons), and lights on the tree are white. You will also notice the gold trim which stands for royalty, riches and victory.

PERSONAL CONVENIENCES. For your convenience, restrooms are located in the southwest corner of the narthex across from the entrance into the sanctuary...feel free to ask for directions. Cell phones should be turned off or put on vibrate mode so as not to disrupt others during the service. Thank you for your cooperation.

To help you focus while you join us for worship, take the time to eliminate as many distractions around you as possible. We may be separated by in-person or livestream worship, but we can connect with each other here for Christian support and encouragement.

WORSHIP NOTES

THE FESTIVAL OF THE NATIVITY

Nativus is Latin for "birth". By the 4th century, the early Christian Church had set December 25th as the day to celebrate the birth of Christ. Along with Easter...it quickly became one of the major celebrations in the Church Year. It always included celebration of the Lord's Supper. This is seen in the word *Christmas*, which is simply short for "Christ's Mass".

THE SEASON OF CHRISTMAS—TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

You are probably familiar with the carol *The Twelve Days of Christmas*. While that carol isn't religious...its title does capture the fact that on Christmas Day the Christian Church begins a twelve-day celebration.



Historically, the celebration of Christmas didn't begin until Christmas Eve. That was the night homes were decorated with trees and tinsel. (It is the secularization of Christmas and the desire to have a longer shopping season that has pushed the "beginning" of Christmas back into November.) Christmas Eve often consisted of a vigil...either at church or in the home...that was quiet and muted. Then...come Christmas Day...all Christians would gather in church as a joyous celebration began. Families would continue to worship (and, yes, give gifts) for twelve straight days. The celebration of Christmas would end with the Festival of the Epiphany...marking the appearance of the Wise Men.

New Year's Eve/Day

The observances of New Year's Eve and New Year's Day are special church traditions...each of which has a rich history. In many places...New Year's Eve is celebrated as a time when God's people gather together in church to express thankfulness for the year and ask God's blessing on the year about to begin. New Year's Day...the 8th day of Christmas...is observed as the time of the Circumcision of Our Lord...a time that previewed and prefigured that day when his sacred blood would be most fully poured out on the cross. One theme that unites the two observances is the theme of light. New Year's Eve celebrates the time of the returning of the light to the world after the shortest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere. New Year's Day celebrates that Jesus...the Light of the World...has come in human form to bring the light of salvation to the darkened world. As you gather for worship...you celebrate that Jesus is your light and your Redeemer.



Ecclesiastes 12:1-7


Remember your Creator now with your strength and service before you return to the ground.







The peace of the Lord be with you always.





DISTRIBUTION

Through the Apostle Paul Jesus tells us that celebrating the Lord's Supper is an expression of our unity with him and with the others who partake in this meal (1 Corinthians 10:16-17). He also says, "So then, whoever eats of the bread and drinks of the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of sinning against the body and blood of the Lord. Everyone ought to examine themselves before they eat of the bread and drink from the cup. For those who eat and drink without discerning the body of Christ eat and drink judgment on themselves" (1 Corinthians 11:27-29). PRAYER


